Several examples of unique insignia worn by reconnaissance motorcycle infantry personnel are shown on this page. On the left are two officer boards with “home-made” camouflage. The first example for a *Hauptmann* is Army hard-edge with modern camouflage; the *Leutnant* board is made out of woven fabric and still has an *Ä* underneath. (ex Robert J. Edwards) The second is unique in a number of respects. The *Ä* has been replaced by a “ghost” image remains. The officer who owned it was especially frugal—or could not find a set of the appropriate *Waffenfarbe*—so he added copper-brown piping to the original rose-pink piping. This was not a unique, however, as some other officer boards have been seen over the years.

This has been seen on other collar tabs before, but never in golden yellow. The officer who wore them is also pictured. (Courtesy of Scott) The **next page** is an example of *SS* collar tab in golden yellow. This has been seen in rose pink before, but never in golden yellow. The tabs are attributed to a *SS* unit in “*Das Reich*” reconnaissance battalion. The author has seen this same practice being done in a period of time by members of the *Totenkopf* reconnaissance battalion. The author has vertical skulls—but they were unable to obtain the photograph. (Courtesy of Martin) Finally, a collar tab in the shape of a skull and crossbones for wear on the *Panzer* uniform, but made out of woven material and featuring golden-yellow wool piping. This was worn on the lapels of the tropical four-pocket uniform of some members of the reconnaissance battalion of the *Panzer-Division*, when it was dispatched to North Africa in 1942. This particular example was captured by a US Army intelligence officer, as evidence of the *SS* presence on the back. (Courtesy of Gary Beadle)
